Chairman's welcome

Welcome to the autumn newsletter telling you all about your charity, Wetwheels Jersey.

It has been another extremely busy year with nearly 1,200 people enjoying an exciting trip on board, with the boat sometimes in use three or four times a day.

We have worked hard to generate more funding for the charity, so that we can continue to offer our trips for free, and also so we can add to the equipment on board, increasing both the safety and the enjoyment of our passengers.

We would like to welcome Appleby on board as a sponsor, and you can read about our new partnership with them inside.

Congratulations to our Operations Director Dina Cook for a much-deserved accolade at this year's IoD Jersey Director of the Year Awards, where she was named Director of the Year for the Third Sector.

We continue to work closely with our friends at the Wetwheels Foundation in the UK, and with the founder of Wetwheels Geoff Holt, who remains in constant contact with us and supports our endeavours to offer a unique and free service to disabled and disadvantaged islanders. Our aim is to increase the number of people we take out to sea to over 1,400 passengers by 2021.

This year we have started to explore opportunities to broaden our service to cover Guernsey as part of our outreach programme. We have also worked closely with other charities, including Helping Wings and the RNLI, with whom we conducted our first emergency exercises in the summer, training our crews in the use of our new 'man overboard' equipment.

With the generosity of The Clarkson Trust, we were able to replace our engines this year and we are building a reserve fund so that when the time comes we can replace Wetwheels with a new vessel.

Finally, on behalf of the entire Board and our Trustees, can I thank you for your continued support and generosity. We are determined to continue to create life-changing opportunities to enjoy our beautiful maritime environment free of charge, and without you this simply would not be possible. HELPING WINGS



A Very Successful Joint Venture - Sponsored by the Ravenscroft Group

3rd July saw Wetwheels team up with Helping Wings to give two groups of disabled or disadvantaged people a truly memorable day out. 20 guests, which were made up of members from Eye Can, Autism Jersey, St Ewolds, Les Amis and Jersey Mancap, were invited to take part. The original concept was to divide the group in two with half travelling to Guernsey on Wetwheels while the others took to the air courtesy of Helping Wings. After lunch in Guernsey the groups would swap passengers before returning to Jersey.

Unfortunately, as so often is the case, the weather conspired against us, by being too windy for Wetwheels to sail to Guernsey. During breakfast at The Aero Club in the presence of both charities' patron Sir Stephen Dalton, the plan was revised. One group took to the water on Wetwheels and were able to cruise round the sheltered waters of the South Coast. Each participant taking turns to steer the boat and show off their driving skills. The others spent the morning flying round Jersey before both groups returned to The Aero Club for a quickly devised lunch courtesy of The Ravenscoft Group, before changing their activity for the afternoon giving everyone a chance of both flying and sailing.

This innovative solution meant cancellation of the event was averted and our 20 guests enjoyed a great day of sailing and flying. It wasn't exactly as planned but that really didn't matter. Helping Wings and Wetwheels had had their first, and very successful, joint event.



RNLI EXERCISE by Colin Masterman

Mid-July this season saw a gathering of skippers and volunteer crew aboard Wetwheels Jersey for a Sunday morning joint exercise with the RNLI Jersey All Weather Lifeboat. The aims of the morning were to practice transfers of casualties between one boat and another, using a rigid stretcher and hoisting casualties, retrieval of MOB and the experience of deploying and using a time expired life raft. Life rafts are cramped and claustrophobic by their very nature and it is good for crew to understand what being inside one feels like. The morning was also an excellent opportunity for crew to work together and share expertise, and bond as a team.

Volunteer crew and skippers of Wetwheels always want to ensure that their skills, and therefore the safety of their passengers, were well and truly rehearsed, should any emergency occur. This was the first of a series of joint exercises that Wetwheels wants to run in conjunction with various rescue services.

We also hope to work alongside The Jersey Lifeboat Association in the future with their All Weather Lifeboat. We also want to work alongside rescue RIBs.

The RNLI crew demonstrated how they stretcher casualties and then transfer them from the casualty vessel to the All-Weather Lifeboat, either manually or using a hoist. Wetwheels has recently been fitted with a similar block and tackle system for assisting with the retrieval of a "man overboard" which in this instance was a dummy. Both crews took time to practise and refine the techniques for this, and the RNLI were able to offer simple but effective revisions and additions to Wetwheels' already good practice.

Finally, Wetwheels launched an expired life raft so that crew could experience what it is like to board, stay in, and alight from such a raft. Wetwheels often carries passengers who are wheelchair users, and this adds an extra dimension to the techniques that need to be thought through. Annually, Wetwheels aims to take over 1000 passengers to sea, who otherwise would not have access to the joys of boating. The youngest passenger was 2 whilst the oldest to date was a spirited 97 years old!

Wetwheels tries to ensure that beneficiaries are active participants, rather than simply passengers and that they have the opportunity to steer the vessel, learn seamanship, gain knowledge of the local maritime features and history and try their luck at fishing alongside their peers, friends and families. The experience is truly inclusive, helping to improve aspirations and increase confidence.

Wetwheels is always seeking additional skippers and crew members so that the demands of the role can be shared. Our crew members have a rich variety of experience and qualifications from RYA Day Skipper and First Aid, to Power Boat 2 and Survival At Sea. However, a background on the sea is a good starting point and a willingness to give some time to trips.

Please tell me that today was good. Wind in our hair, life jackets strapped on. The scary gangway is very steep, but strong arms, and legs make it safe. Is it raining? The boat gets rocky, rolling movement fills your body. The big spray water soaks us. We look like Dracula, big black capes, flapping, hooded over our eyes. We are cold and wet. Eyes shut, we are racing across the water. We could be anywhere. Our still bodies are rocking and rolling. We are free, on the sea. We lunch in the 'Caribbean'. Some are swimming, shouting, laughter, having fun.

We are separate, silent and still. But the thrill is catching. Our salty face and lips make the picnic taste so good.

Please tell me that today was good. Today is not like all my other days. Today revives old memories, and makes new ones. Yes, today was good.


